



Nurture and develop our people – making sure we can recruit, develop and retain staff who make a difference to the lives of our children and young people


Strengthen and grow – driving ourselves to improve through self-evaluation and learning from others, both inside and outside the trust.



Being part of the this group of schools will enable us to collaborate and support each other. United we will be able to share good practice for our children and growing school community.

Due to close location, Ashbury, Shrivenham and Longcot & Fernham share the same Christian Values each term. Stories are delivered through the bible with Revd. Norma and Mr Fergusson visit each school weekly. These school follow Roots and Fruits.

Ashbury School prayer is used in the other schools during Collective Worship with Revd. Norma and Mr Fergusson. Further collaboration is currently being planned to enable groups of children to collaborate and share their thoughts about our termly values.

With these links this supports us to visit other local churches during the year and enter prayer space in different settings





Trust Governance

Within FLT there is a deep belief that strong governance is essential to ensure a strong Trust. The Trustees bring skills, knowledge and experience to their roles. They work closely with the CEO to guarantee the success of the Trust and all its schools.

The governance structure consists of Members, and Trustees of the board and its committees. The committees include the local governing bodies of individual schools.

The work of the board is directed by the Articles of Association, funding agreements, governance handbook and the Academies Financial Handbook.

MEMBERS

The four Members are akin to shareholders and have ultimate control over the direction of the Trust. They ensure the charitable company achieves its objectives, sign off the financial accounts and annual reports, and appoint some of the Trustees. They hold responsibility for:

- · Changing the Articles of Association
- · Deciding on a change of school category
- · Amendments to the Funding Agreement
- Appointing Trustees
- Appoint the Trust's external auditors









THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

They are essentially responsible for the day-to-day running of the 'company'.

The board of Trustees consists of:

- · Eight Trustees appointed by Members
- . Three Trustees appointed by the Oxfordshire Diocesan Board of Education (ODBE)
- A Chief Executive Officer (ex-officio)























School Governance

- In 1724 a Charity School formed from subscriptions by Ratepayers Tenant farmers. It was a school for the poor children of the village.
- 1777 Thomas Stock opens the very first Sunday school in the country here in Ashbury.
- 1843 The Charity School became a National School presented to the village by The Earl of Craven.
- 1863 Plans drawn up for a three classroom new school costing £600 opened on January 1st 1865 in what is now the Village Hall.
- In 1864 The Rev Henry Miller was chairman and secretary supported by James Lawrence, Mrs J Humphrey and Mr H Humphrey. They
 appointed Mr Asher Ball and his sister Miss Ann Ball as Master and Mistress.
- 1959 New school buildings open as Ashbury with Compton Beauchamp C.E V.A School.
- These schools were run by a board of managers. Shown in school log books from 1864 onwards.

These boards numbered five or six members only and each member had to swear an oath on appointment that he or she was a member of the Church of England.

To ensure our school follows it's Christian Character and leads in the way God has shown us in the history of the school, our Governance

structure is as follows:

4 governors appointed by the Church Council

2 governors appointed by the Diocese

1 headteacher (ex-officio)

1 staff member (elected by staff)

2 parents (elected by parents)







What are we doing here? Trust and Governance Accountability Faringdon Learning Trust

3 Members of the Trust Board are appointed from the Oxford Diocesan Board of Education. These members ensure that the Christian Character of our school is maintained with the decisions made at Trust level.

Our school Governors are very proactive and visible in school. Each Governor holds an area of responsibility – they visit school regular to monitor and hold leaders to account. As well as their main focus during visits, Governors are also looking to ensure the Christian Character, Vision, Ethos and Culture are developing in all that we do in school on a daily basis. Governors report their visits to the LGB using Governor Hub and in meetings.

With Governors strategic strategies, our school continues to develop and support all stakeholders to flourish.



Collective Worship

Ashbury CE Primary School is a Church of England Voluntary Aided School and worship is therefore a central focus of the school day as it gives us the opportunity to come together as a school community; worship offers the pupils and others in our school an opportunity to reflect on values and issues in the context of our Christian vision and ethos. Collective worship inspires the school community to experience the wonder of life and the world; developing spiritual and moral values.

Religious Education

The purpose of RE is to teach children about the religious and non-religious world-views that they will encounter in modern Britain and enable them to engage in meaningful and considered dialogue with those of all faiths and none. This is important to us at Ashbury CE Primary School as children need a good understanding of the world around them – we want our children to be accepting of others regardless of their religion, but also to understand other religions and beliefs.

The RE curriculum at Ashbury CE Primary School, has been approved by the Governors. Christianity is taught in every year group, with key concepts revisited on a spiral curriculum. To ensure our children know more and remember more, the spiral curriculum helps children to recall facts when revisiting familiar religions.

More than 50% of the time is devoted to Christianity. Other religions are covered according to the syllabus.

- EYFS: Judaism;
- * KS1: Judaism, Other Religious & Other Non-Religious World Views;
 - * KS2: Hinduism, Islam & Other Non-Religious World Views.

The total time for RE is between 5% and 10% of the school timetable, and it is taught in dedicated lessons/blocks/cross-curricular settings as appropriate – this enables children to make links across other subjects and supports then to use their Christian Values in all they do.

The time dedicated to RE is separate from the time given to Collective Worship. All children receive 1¼ hours of RE lessons each week.



Relationship with ODBE (Oxford Diocesan Board of Education)

ODBE offer training to ensure our school can remain up to date and current with any changes to SIAMS, RE, Collective Worship or any other Church related matters.

There are regular newsletter emails, Network meetings, RE resources and document links shared.


School works closely with our Diocese Advisor – Chris Price-Smith.

Teachers have been trained to deliver successful spiritual times using Space Makers.

Headteacher attends Performance, Resilience & Support Programme, which had been a huge benefit. This gives time to pause and reflect on the personal professional journey and spiritual leadership, as well as sharing strategies for addressing the challenges of headship.

There has been great support with our Admissions Policy and support for Governors to determine admissions arrangements.

We recognise there is a Mediation Service and school review support should we like to use it. With all of this support in place it helps our school to live out its Christian vision and live up to our foundation as a Church school, enabling all stakeholders to flourish.



Relationship with Local Churches

Ashbury CE Primary School has strong links with local Churches.

These relationships enhance our ability to live out our Christian vision as a Church School, enabling everyone to flourish in multiple ways including: Spiritual time, pastoral support, nurture, Christian calendar celebrations, Understanding of Christianity, just to name a few.

We take the whole school to Church regularly to celebrate Christmas, Easter, Mothers' Day, Leavers' Service. These are wonderful service supported by Clergy. Our children lead these service with support from Revd. Norma and Mr Fergusson.

We also take part in Prayer Space every year – these are led by the BeSpace team. These are wonderful events where children can join in the variety of activities relating to a theme, having time to reflect about themselves, the people around us locally

and the wider world. The theme this year was Narnia.



In times of need, Revd. Norma will share her pastoral support and work with children, families and staff 1:1. This is a wonderful opportunity to show how loved our whole community is and how we all support one another. Revd. Norma and Mr Fergusson love to join us also in celebrating throughout the year for various occasions e.g joining FLT.







Governors attend SIAMS working party discussions to look at a different strand to reflect on what is working well and what can we develop further.


Governors look at progress data and offer challenge to ensure all children are supported and given opportunities to make excelled progress.

Governors are active members of our school and regularly visit the school during the school day. Their monitoring notes reflect the vision of the school and reference their findings about the various aspects of school life at Ashbury CE Primary School.







Children write our school prayer each term helping them to understand the value of the term – how this affects themselves and others.

Children are given the opportunity to discuss and reflect on their learning in Collective Worship – we now see more participation in Collective Worship.



Whole school Spiritual time – Space Makers – happens after playtime – this has helped children reflect on their playtimes, celebrate successes and let go of and grievance and playtimes – children are coming into the classroom ready to learn.

We are a very inclusive school where all children are challenged and supported to achieve their full potential. We use adaptive teaching ensure inclusivity is of high priority.

Our children led an assembly about accepting differences and how it can make others feel if they are bullied.

Our polices have been updated to ensure they reflect inclusivity and equality.

Jigsaw is part of our PSHE curriculum and shared a variety of topic with our children – the discussions and questions show they are inquisitive and accepting of differences.

Our School Council have a big impact across our school and wider community.

School Council meet regularly to discuss ways to improve our school and wider community, local, national and globally.

Helping others to flourish they have chosen to support Yeshua's Children's Ministry in South Africa. Over the last 2 years we have raised over £600 that has been donated to support children to go to school in Munzieville and Kleinvallei.

More children are now willing to share their achievements from in school and out of school in our celebration assembly.



We believe in building up relationships is key to positive behaviours outcomes – this has supported the change in mindsets, resulting in a positive ethos and culture in our school.

Our Long Term plans support children to build on their learning year after year. This is helping children to make links between subjects and topics that they engage with each year. Children are beginning know more and remember more as a result.

Through listening to pupil voice, we know have more trips and experiences to engage our children and give them first hand experiences. In KS2 children have the opportunity to attend a residential trip – this helps to develop life skills and embed what they have learnt about our Values and Vision.

Through creating topic books, children are able to look back and discuss their achievements and learning across their educational journey. These are helping children to make links in their learning.

Children who are not making good or better progress are identified early to ensure they are fully support – interventions are in place to ensure any gaps can be identified and filled effectively.

Throughout each school year, children are asked what further opportunities and clubs they would like to experience in school. Various clubs are then offered each term, relating to the children's requests.



Progressively deeper opportunities exist across the curriculum in all subjects, which enable pupils to develop curiosity through questioning that helps them explore and articulate spiritual and ethical issues.



School ensure families are fully supported emotionally, financially or in ways that are individual to each situation. Families are supported through not only the school staff, but also Family Wellbeing sessions in school every other week, family support worker from the Faringdon Learning Trust, Inclusion team support – through working together, families are fully supported to ensure children are able to achieve their full potential not only in school, but also outside of school.

School have built links with other agencies to ensure families and children feel supported in all aspects of their lives. Links have been developed with Young Carers team in Oxfordshire as well as sign posting families to other services and social groups.

Staff have worked hard to build up good relationships with parents/carers to ensure wellbeing is of high priority. If children's wellbeing is nurtured and looked after, they will be in a great place to engage in learning.


